**Communities in rural India which are vibrant, healthy, and safe, and where each person has access to opportunities to reach their full potential.**


### **How we do this**

- In the Uluru Children's Home by providing shelter, care and holistic education to destitute children.


- Through our Community Development Programs by working with local groups to create active and empowered communities.

## Where we do this

TEWFI works with fishing and farming communities in the 24 villages of Edaiakazhinadu Panchayat with a population of 32,000 on the south east coast of India. We are located 100km south of Tamil Nadu capital, Chennai, and 45km north of Pondicherry.

We acknowledge with heartfelt gratitude the consistent support of our donors, volunteers and staff of the Foundation, without which all that we have been able to accomplish would not have been possible.

The gracious pro bono involvement of **all the members** of the **Finance and Governance committee**, the **Children and Community committee**, the **Staffing Committee**, and the **Thursday Working Group** (which, meeting fortnightly, has become the main forum and driver of the day to day running of all aspects of the Foundation), and the time, thought and effort so graciously given is gratefully acknowledged.

The Foundation is acutely conscious of the need to secure its continuing works with **a corpus fund**.

Most of the Foundation's funds are still raised through the gracious donations made by its supporters in India and around the world.

The Day Sponsorship Programme now has 132 days sponsored and is slowly heading towards the desired target of 365 days.

We now have 68 families belonging to the Foundation Family Fellowship Programme.

The Uluru Health Care Centre has continued doing excellent work in the region. The work of Dr. Premnath and his team is highly regarded by the entire community, and they are kept extremely busy. The contributions of Dr Roy Karna as the pro bono Medical Director of the Health Services at TEWFI have been invaluable. A gracious donation has made it possible to purchase a Chevrolet Tavera as the replacement vehicle for our stolen Mahindra Bolero. The Uluru Children's Home (UCH) continues to provide a loving, caring environment for the children. Mrs. Geetha and her staff are to be commended. Under the guidance of Mrs. Geetha and UCH teachers the educational standards of our children at UCH continue to grow. Education in the arts for the

children continues along with their academic education. The Foundation continues to be actively involved in the education of the community through: (1) the Vicki Standish e-Education Centre with its in-house and outreach programmes (in particular through its innovative “electronic Classroom on Wheels” projects); and (2) the Uluru Nursery and Primary School (UNPS). Three classrooms for UNPS are now under construction.

The Foundation’s many Community Development initiatives and activities continue making a significant positive impact in the community.

The Women’s Centre continues to serve and make a positive and significant impact on the well-being of women and the girl child.

The Uluru Coastal Environment Education Centre continues educating the children of UCH and the community in coastal ecology and conservation. Thanks to Mr. Sudhakar and his team’s hard work the Foundation land is looking green and beautiful.

I have only touched briefly on some of the major happenings the past year but there are many others that you can read about in other parts of this report.

## HEALTH

### The Uluru Health Care Centre

UHCC was opened in 1998. It was the first and only comprehensive health care facility in the region. A local graduate doctor originally from Pondicherry, Dr S Premnath, is currently running the Medical Unit with expert back up assistance from a long serving chief nurse, two senior nurses, a pharmacist and social workers to provide holistic type care for the community and the children and



staff of The East West Foundation. UHCC provides medical services to 32,000 villagers, mainly women and children with an average turnout of 80 patients a day. It plays a critical role in meeting health concerns in a region where local primary health centres are lacking facilities and inefficient. The UHCC staff conduct regular medical check-

ups and dispense medicines. We provide free medicines to old, poor, and tribal people from community. In case of any emergencies we arrange transport through our hospital ambulance for the local population.

Doctor Premnath was trained to assist with knee problems through our well known Dr Roy Karna during his visit to India and now treats patients with the knee problems and injects intra articular knee injections.

### **Mobile Health Care Clinic**

The Mobile Health Care Clinic reaches out daily to the most vulnerable and remote sections of the population including tribal communities, aged people, women and children who benefit from medical advice and treatment provided at their doorstep. Importantly this program offers beneficiaries access to quality medical services, something that they ordinarily would not be able to get. It covers all 24 villages in Edaikazhinadu Town Panchayat. It is run by experienced nurses with necessary medical equipment and medicines. When the mobile clinic team enters the village, they announce through public speaker the camp location and consulting times. The common camp locations are community halls, schools, public temples and anganvadis where the community people can access easily. The usual conditions seen are cough, headache, viral fever, pain. Seriously ill patients are referred to our Health Centre doctor.

In 2015-2016 we saw 1770 patients across the 24 villages. Although this is slightly less than last year's number it still indicates the absolute need for services such as these.

### **Doctors visit from Australia:**

In March, Dr Susan Downes and Dr Cathy Davis, as scholarship recipients and

conference attendees at the Southern India Medical Conference organized by Unconventional Conventions, spent two weeks treating patients at the Uluru Health Care. This was a rare opportunity for us to have women's health issues addressed by female



doctors. At the Clinic they concentrated on female patients of all ages and religions. They saw many women, 10-15 patients per day, and some men and children.

14 doctors visited the Uluru Health Care Centre in March as part of a pre-Conference program offered by the Southern India Medical Conference organisers Unconventional Conventions. We gained valuable insights through this cross-cultural exchange when these doctors from Australia visited.

## **Diabetes and Breastfeeding Awareness Program:**



On November 14, 2016 on World Diabetes Day we arranged an awareness program at the Women's centre by Dr Susan Downes. The nurses facilitated these sessions efficiently. At the program we were also accompanied with the Government Hospital's Volunteer Health Nurse. They assisted with two education sessions for the

community: breastfeeding and diabetes. They gave information on how to assist during the period of breastfeeding. The personal care which they should undergo. These were well attended by enthusiastic patients.

## **EDUCATION**

### **Uluru Nursery and Primary School**

The Annual Report for 2016-17 provides an account of the operations and achievement throughout the year.

UNPS has a clear vision and purpose focused on excellence in teaching and learning through games, puzzles, flash cards, mind maps, flow charts, projects arts etc. We also take classes outside the classroom.

Established in 2012, UNPS has been preparing our children for the future. We focus on supporting all students to reach their full potential academically, socially and emotionally.

We have committed and dedicated teachers working to help each child to reach their potential. We have adopted a wide variety of innovative teaching practices.

We have organized and conducted various programmes in this academic year. Independence Day and Republic Day were celebrated with children giving patriotic speeches on India and Indian leaders who sacrificed their lives for

India's freedom. There were also dances by the children after the Flag hoisting. Teacher's Day and children's Day was also celebrated with enthusiasm. Even religious festivals were celebrated in our school.

UNPS has a clear vision, focused on excellence in teaching and learning. We aim to provide the best possible education for each student ensuring they develop a broad range of skills to adapt to a changing world.

Focus in 2017-18 will be proficiency strands of understanding, fluency, reasoning and school events.

There has been a constant and continuous request at the Parent's Teacher's meeting for transport facilities for the children because the parents have difficulty in bringing the children due to their nature of their occupation i.e. fishing and farming communities.



## Vicki Standish electronic Education Centre

The extremely poor educational infrastructure, lack of facilities and lack of teaching staff in the Edaiakazhinadu Panchayat prompted TEWFI to build the region's first rural Computer centre 10 years ago. It has since become a multifunctional Village Knowledge Centre for the region. Providing the community with access to vital technical, educational and online employment information.

The Centre is utilized by the community children, youth and adolescent girls each weeknight and during the day on weekends.



Basic computer education, tally courses for accounting people, desktop publishing and advanced computer education have been taught in the centre. From 6.to 7.30pm the children from UCH utilize the centre for the e-learning programs. Programs for them are scheduled also on the weekends.

It is significant that during this 2016-2017 period with laptops that were gifted by the Ford Company in Chennai and the regular duration of classes was extended from an hour to two hours. Needless to say this extended duration of class was thoroughly enjoyed by the students and what is more it attracted lot more students from the communities for the classes.

## eClassroom on Wheels1 Project

First eClassroom on Wheels (eCoW1) project started in August 2010. The mobile classroom uses an altered and renovated bus to travel to remote government Primary schools to provide IT and Computer education, targeting the 8 primary schools. This program is continuing in the Panchayat Primary schools, the total

number of beneficiaries this program serves is 200 students of which 150 children are female and 50 students are male.



One remarkable achievement during this year of this program is that even dropped-out students turned up at school only for this program with very keen interest and enthusiasm. In fact, they could not wait for the next class!

### eClassroom on Wheels2 Project



Given the success of the first eClassroom on Wheels (eCoW1) project, TEWFI launched the eCoW2 project. The impact of the project has been significant. The mobile classroom uses an updated reconstituted bus to travel out to rural and remote government school to provide IT and Computer education.


Services such as these have a major impact on education in rural India and give children the opportunity to learn how computers work, something they would ordinarily not have been provided. It also gives these children skills for the future, particularly in a country that is becoming heavily reliant on the IT sector and general computing skills.

The bus seats 33 students with each seat having a foldout desk for laptops. There is a LCD TV that is used to display the lessons for the children to follow. However, the key feature of the bus is that all the electronics and amenities in the bus are solar powered. A modern sound system and fans for the benefit of the students.

The eCoW II project specifically targeted the middle school students. The significant result of this project is that the students are fully equipped to effectively handle the computer courses in the higher secondary classes. During the year 2016-2017, after finishing our project in Marakkanam Town Panchayat. We switched back to Edaikazhinadu Town Panchayat and continued our services. Total number of beneficiaries this program serves is 250 students of which 160 children are female and 90 students are male.

We have now started classes for VIII standard students who were in Middle School last year. We are teaching Basic computer classes, twice weekly.

### **The project goes to 8 schools in the surrounding area:**



## **Mobile Computer Wallah Project**

This Programme is continuing in the Panchayat Primary Schools at Kadapakkam, Vennagupattu, Vembanur, and Kottaikadu. The total number of beneficiaries this year in this Programme was 350 students.

### **eCoW Summer Programme:**

During the summer vocation of schools in the Marakkanam village block. We gave free computer training for that entire village schools' students. 80 students participated, of whom 40 were boys and 40 were girls. 35 of the above



80 students are from scheduled caste, 25 from most backward caste, about 10 from the Muslim community, the rest from other communities. All the above students come from Chunambedu village near Marakkanam, a distance of 15 kilometers. They eagerly await our bus to arrive and they attend the classes with total concentration. The teaching includes verbal lectures and visual demonstration.

## **Village Knowledge Centre**

This centre offers innumerable other services like downloading all kinds of job applications, typing any materials, finding online results of school, college and university examination results, accessing all English newspapers, Government exams application online, Hall ticket download. We also help apply for Government jobs.

The local community people benefit from the various programs we offer free of cost.

## ICT class for Uluru Nursery & Primary School



Participants in this program include all the kids at our Uluru Nursery & Primary School, also their teachers and ICT teachers. The classes commence at 11.00am and lasts up to 12.30pm. The subjects taught include those set by the Government of Tamil Nadu for the schools in the state as per the curriculum and syllabi. Ms. Sangeetha ICT teacher conducts this class, explaining both verbally and with visual video program. The class is conducted on Mondays for L.K.G, Tuesdays for U.K.G, Wednesdays for I standard, Thursdays for II standard, Fridays for III and IV standards. It has been observed that these students enjoy the visual classes very much.

## CHILD RIGHTS

### Uluru Children Home



In India the number of abandoned children especially females, is high and continuously on the rise despite the government and NGO's doing their best to curtail this. TEWFI had been very concerned about this and the high rate of female infanticide for some time and these factors motivated the Foundation to build the Uluru Children's Home (UCH ) in 2001.

Since 2003 UCH has been a home for abandoned, destitute and Orphan children. After the TSUNAMI in 2004, there were many destitute male children in the surrounding villages. We then started admitting these male children also. Now the Children's Home is taking care of both boys and girls. UCH has been giving opportunity for local women and men to be appointed as House Mothers, carers, cooks, cleaners and security personnel.  
At UCH the children are getting shelter, food, clothes education, safety and beautiful environment completely free.  
Currently there are 45 children housed at the Uluru Children's Home (UCH)

The children come to UCH with very dysfunctional and traumatic backgrounds affecting various aspects of their physical, mental and biological growth. The children are nurtured with love and care by facilitating an environment in which they can realize their full potential by ensuring the roles and responsibilities they are given equip them for the future. There is provision to admit more children to the children's home complying with all the statutory requirements of the Government.

## **Arts and Sports**

The UCH strives to ensure that the lives of the children residing here is as peaceful and fulfilling as possible. The children are learning Bharatanatyam, Carnatic Music and Karate. Fifteen children are in Music and Dance class. We are very proud to say that 10 children have obtained Black Belt. The children are also very good in volley ball, Tennis, Chess and carom.



## UCH Education

The UCH children are performing very well at school and we received good comments from the Headmasters and Teachers.

The children have tuition in the evening at UCH and it helps them to learn better than other children.

Two children have finished their higher studies. They are working now. This year 5 children have gone to higher studies. Totally 11 children are in university now.



## COMMUNITY HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

We have been involved in numerous community development projects in the region since 1995. TEWFI has extended its activities under Community Health and Development Projects to encompass all the 24 villages in the Edaikazhinadu Panchayat.

### Community Health

#### Free Eye Camps

TEWFI has always arranged for the villages of Edaikazhinadu Panchayat to have access to eye camps, where they can get free treatment for eye problems. TEWFI has been conducting eye camps every year bringing doctors, technicians nurses and volunteers for the camp. For the poor villagers of Edaikazhinadu Panchayat these eye camps are most welcome, and the villagers thank and appreciate these services by TEWFI

This year eye camp was organized in collaboration with Aravind Eye Hospital Pondicherry and was a grand success. 285 patients were seen of which 28 underwent free surgeries by a team of four Doctors, 10, Nurses and other staff and volunteers who offered their valuable services free of charge. Eye glasses were supplied, and post-operative care was also rendered. The patients were all full of praise for the treatment, attention and kindness of the doctors and their staff.



### **Alcohol, Smoking and Drug Awareness**

In the rural area in which TEWFI operates there is a relatively high amount of substance abuse, particularly of alcohol. Our programs are tailored to help people understand the devastating impact of alcohol and other substance abuse. We also support people who are addicted and need assistance in addressing these issues.

### **Other Programs and Awareness Campaigns**

- Diabetes
- Food and Nutrition

This Programme was conducted for the benefit of pregnant ladies and also young mothers with newborn babies. Mrs. Devi Krishna of our Foundation, Mrs. Annal Chandra, nurse at our Uluru Health Care Centre, Local Government Hospital nurses and our Social workers Mr. A. Sathyamoorthy, Mr. G. Govindu were present.

### **Purpose of the Programme:**

- ❖ To prevent birth of babies without the benefit of nutritious food.
- ❖ Prevention of death of mother and the child at the time of birth
- ❖ Provide facilities for birth and bringing up of healthy babies
- ❖ Educating all mothers giving birth to babies as to what food they should take and what food they should avoid
- ❖ Educating all mothers about risks and problems they and their children may face during pregnancy.
- ❖ Create awareness among pregnant ladies and mothers of newborn babies about the diseases and deformities that may be caused due to deficiency of nutritious food



### **Community Development**

#### **General knowledge competition**

TEWFI always laid great emphasis and importance on improving the general knowledge among its children; as mere book study will not help the students to secure jobs and face competitive examinations. So the social workers conducted various general knowledge competitions

It is a matter of common knowledge that the students and in particular the students in village schools have very poor and inadequate general knowledge. This will be a great handicap for them to compete with students from towns

and cities. Acquisition of general knowledge will be very helpful to succeed in government examinations and competitive entrance tests. So TEWFI conducted lots of general knowledge competitions and gave prizes to winners and certificates to all participants.



### **Evening English Classes**

TEWFI's volunteers from overseas, along with our social workers run Evening English Classes in the local communities in the surrounding villages. They use their own initiative on how to inspire and teach the class. An assessment



format has been prepared and the progress of the students regularly assessed. Those who attend this class have been segregated into different groups according to their level. The children at primary, intermediate and advanced level develop their skills in comprehending and speaking in English.

### **Career Guidance Programs**

In this program students are educated about the different types of courses, the nature and the value of the courses, the University from which they can pursue the course, the qualification required for the enrolment etc. Students are

motivated through this program. Topics such as goal setting, planning to achieve these goals and managing time efficiently were also covered in this program. It also helps keep students informed about the opportunities and paths they may pursue in the future.

### **Summer camp program**

During the summer vocation community children can spend their time with us on very constructive activities. This annual camp was held 1<sup>st</sup> may 2017 and conducted for 12 communities over 5 days. The venue for the Programme was chosen in such a way that the children from at least 2 or 3 communities could participate in a camp. The activities included a camp craft work, drawing activities etc.

## **Women's Tailoring and Handcraft Centre**

The TEWFI Women's Centre was constructed in conjunction with UNDP India. It has been used for many vocational training activities such as handloom creation and candle making. Currently it is being used as a tailoring centre for women. The trainees are divided into two sessions every day, with 15 trainees at each session and the Centre is open five days a week. The duration of the course is six months.



- ❖ First trainees are taught embroidery work using needle by hand.
- ❖ Do the designing of the dress first by paper cutting
- ❖ Do the cloth cutting is the next step
- ❖ The final tailoring of the clothes is taught
- ❖ 25 varieties (designs) of clothes, 15 varieties of embroidering work and several varieties of handicrafts and fancy items are taught to be made.

### **Outcome of the Programme:**

Certificates of successful completion of the training is issued by The East West Foundation of India.

- ❖ Sixty-seven trainees have successfully completed the training.
- ❖ Of these 30 women are working from home making a decent income.
- ❖ Two of them work for a dress manufacturing company and earn a decent income.
- ❖ The rest of them make clothes for themselves and their families, thus saving lot of money.
- ❖ those who make their dresses themselves derive a great mental satisfaction from their competence

## **ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY**

### **Uluru Coastal Environment Education Centre**

The Uluru Coastal Environment Education Centre (UCEEC) is an unique initiative and has since 2004 played an important role in creating awareness in young and old minds about the rich marine ecosystem prevalent in this region. It provides children from the UCH and from the wider community a holistic understanding of the environment, green thinking, waste management and a deeper appreciation of the ecology of the region.



The Uluru Coastal Environmental Education Centre was set up by TEWFI soon after the 2004 Tsunami and plays an important role in creating awareness in young minds on the rich marine ecosystems.

The UCEEC is a unique initiative set up to educate and facilitate research on the local marine eco system. Its main goal is to create awareness of this unique eco-estuarine environment amongst children and the wider community.

## Environmental Management & Rejuvenation

UCEEC plays an important role in creating environmental awareness for our UCH children. It conducts Saturday classes, involving them in our students' nursery to make nursery packets and nurturing the plants.

We have also been giving them knowledge of fauna and flora. We prepared special curriculum about our environmental studies for our UCH, UNPS and the community children.



## Vegetable and Tree Planting Activities

UCEEC planned to increase our UNPS student environmental responsibilities. So, they have been involved in nurturing plants in their school area.

Seeds are handed over to them to sow and to maintain them. They watered them every day and observed the continuous growth.



They were very happy to see the baby plants sprouting out from the seeds. And finally, they were allowed to take out the plants and plant them in the nursery packets.

We have taken the students out for a field visit and explained the marine eco system and the kinds of pollution.

As well as education at the UCEEC, the UCH and Community children are heavily involved in gardening activities. They are responsible for creating and maintaining a number of vegetable patches around the TEWFI campus. The vegetables grown are subsequently cooked for the children. This activity results in greater knowledge for them as they see firsthand how vegetables are produced and eventually consumed. We are presently yielding very high amounts of vegetables including green chilli, beans, greens, eggplant, bitter gourd, radish, drumsticks, tomatoes and okra.

Along with vegetable patches the children are also involved in tree planting.

### **VEGETABLE GARDEN**



The vegetable garden near the rainwater harvesting tank is slowly getting damaged because of the high salinity of water. Our bore well water seems to be in good condition from mid-November to April. After that the salinity of water increases and doesn't support the vegetable garden as well as for cooking and drinking purposes. We have established a model kitchen garden at the environment centre to create awareness about the organic forming.

## **PLANTATION AT TEWFI**

The planted trees at UNPS and UCEEC area are growing very well and look beautiful.

We also started mulching work under the trees planted by Mr. Joss's team and water the plants regularly.

At the time of monsoon our team went to some forests and collected seeds of many big tree plants and planted them in our campus.

## **SEWAGE**

UCEEC put more effort to maintain our sewage pond. At the time of summer the sewage purifying plants died and the purification stopped.

At that time our team cleaned the sewage pond and filled fresh water in half the pond. Then we put new purifying plants in the pond.

After that the plants grew well and the purification process started.



Now the sewage pond is functioning very well. We also did some beautifying work surrounding the sewage pond.

## Cow project

TEWFI was donated 10 cows in 2012 to help UCH become more sustainable. They produce a fair amount of milk that has significantly subsidised the milk needs at the home.

A Biogas unit is due to be installed to convert the cow dung into cooking gas for our kitchen.

The intangible benefit of the project is the impact it is having on our children. A team of four UCH Children daily have been assisting the cowherds to clean the cows, their shed and milk the cows each morning. This is yet another activity that gives the children a holistic experience in life.


