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RACHEL GOLDBERG



Ron Castan AM QC (1939-1999) was one of Australia's greatest Human Rights lawyers. The road and bridge are a tribute by Ron's family to his journey, an important part of which included his trip to India as a law student in 1960 when he met the Dalai Lama and Prime Minister Nehru.

Nellie spoke warmly to the staff and the Uluru children about Ron's contribution to Human Rights and also spoke of his journey in life.



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VOLUNTEER BARRY COOPER'S REFLECTIONS ON ULURU VISIT FEBRUARY 2019

"The thing is that I now have a much better idea of the challenging context within which Uluru is making its tremendous achievement. If it was only happy children that would be enough, but it's far far more ..."

First of all, what an achievement Uluru is: the Children's home, the Clinic, the School, the link with Auroville ... All have become part of the community and as I grow to understand the 'political' challenges within the community, that's been no easy task....

The Financial Literacy Program

My idea was to expose different groups to different parts of the Financial Literacy spectrum. The Trading and Saving Game for Littlies:

Lesson #1: was that there were little Littlies and not-solittle Littlies, both of whom played in different ways - and therefore requiring a different

teaching program.

Lesson #2: was that in Tamil Nadu, the concept is not so much Trading and Saving but Bargaining

and Accumulating!

Lesson #3: was environmental: the overhead fans can play havoc with lightweight teaching

materials! Personally it was a joy to see (and hear!!) them all enter into the spirit of the

game.

The Bookkeeping Program:

The next step in the sequence was the Student group who worked through the professional technicalities of taking simple bookkeeping records and turning them into Accountant-speak ... Profit & Loss, Balance Sheet and Cash Flow Statement - and knowing why. In these sessions, the contribution of Usha, Siran and Meneka was immense - and they all now know how to work from the prepared scripts and run the session. For this group, I, with Siran's help, hooked iniPax.com into the overhead



projector and showed how the whole book-keeping, financial statements and benchmarking exercise can be done online. iniPax.com is a website that I've developed over the years and is available (free of charge) to Uluru. So ... the Littlies have now been introduced to Bargaining and Accumulation; the Students have acquired technical accounting skills that will benefit the community. Which leads to the next group ... Uluru staff.

Community Outreach

Uluru and its staff are respected members of the community. It doesn't take much imagination to see them as the villages' go to people when advice is needed or things start to go wrong. So the sessions with staff were designed to let them know about their new resource: the Students, Usha, Siran and Meneka. People who can be called on if help and advice is called for from the villagers. Staff were shown what is available and when it could be

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applied - but none of the technical stuff ... that's already in good hands, those of the Students. The students are now quite capable of entering data from bookkeeping records and explaining financial ratios and benchmarks.

Women's Groups

The fourth group were down in the Community Centre: the Women's groups ... the pinnacle of the sequence, the people who can apply all this Financial Literacy stuff. The sessions began with the things that can make a business better, the global benchmarks that are just as relevant to a watermelon farm as the Tata Group... Again, Usha and Siran were fantastic at turning my words into those that the women could comprehend. The interaction ranged from 'how can I use this to start a watermelon farm?' to 'That's not the way we do things around here'.

So ... to summarise the Sequence ...

- Littlies, an introduction to business
- Students, technical hands-on exposure to Financial Statements and Benchmarks
- Staff, introduction to the skills that Uluru can offer to the community
- Women's Group, direct explanation of the business benefits of a well-maintained bookkeeping program

All very well, but what did all this really achieve?

I believe that the program and the audiences were right. My own personality defect is that I always feel that I could have done better. That's not false modesty. I have brought a lot back and have a lot of re-writing/re-building to do - which I'll certainly share when it's done....I could have made much better use of your technology ... computer lab and overhead projector ... but I think that my learning Tamil is a bridge too far. Gujji helped me with a page of phrases that I thought might break the ice (not an appropriate metaphor, given the glorious weather) but I'm afraid that when I tried them I was met with blank stares - followed by gales of laughter when my attempts were translated by Uluru people! Inevitably, 7 days is too brief. but as I've said, I've already embarked on rethinking my material and will get it back to Uluru as soon as it's done.

Finally, the People

I wish I could name all of them, but I can talk about those with whom I have worked directly. I've had long talks with Aditi...we talked about so many things and explored so many ideas in such a short time... Usha and Siran, brother and sister, brought life to the various sessions by listening to my words and presenting them to an audience that clearly 'got it'. Great minds, both of them, and lovely people. Meneka did the same for the second student session - and was always there to lend support and reassurance on so many other little things....The teaching staff, from the Littlies room to the computer lab. Raj - who, with immense skill, kept me alive to and from Chennai and to and from Pondy (see how I'm talking like a local!). Geetha who watched quietly and was always welcoming. The Clinic who treated my blistered toe as though it was heart surgery. The Chef ... loved every mouthful but was so generous I may never eat again! The social worker (I'm sorry, one name I didn't catch) who was so kind and supportive when we went to the Women's group and then back at Uluru. The Fishing fleet. Always there, seen and heard, day and night. The joy of the farewell concert on Saturday evening. The Bird Life. THE KIDS.


The Day Sponsorship donors have played a key role in assisting the Foundation to keep operating over the years and we would love to have 365 days fully covered.
